"Miss Edith" left Washington County at age five when her Mom, Annie Jordan, wanted her girls to take advantage of the educational opportunities available in Mobile. They left the one-room school in Yarbo for Leinkauf Elementary. In rural communities, in those days, school was dismissed for planting and harvest; larger cities did not.

Annie Jordan did not like idle children, so all three daughters were very involved in after-school instruction. Young Edie studied piano, violin, elocution, and ballroom dance in addition to swimming, diving, basketball, and cheerleading. Her senior year at Murphy High School, Miss Edith had her own piano concert which was sponsored by one of Mobile's best piano instructors of the day.

She had a life-long love of the arts and friends of the arts including the beloved and long-time director of the Mobile Opera, Madame Rose Tenser. After Miss Edith's death in 2011 at the age of 95, her daughter found this quote in her Mom's handwriting:

"But God be praised, if you have something to live for, you will not fall apart easily, and art has more than anything this refreshing power that transcends all grief."

About the Artist:

Born in Kazakhstan, Kadisha Onalbayeva began her musical training at the age of five. She attended the Jubanov Special School for talented children and the Kurmangazy National Conservatory of Music in Kazakhstan



where she studied piano and composition, gave recitals, and was involved in both piano and composition festivals and competitions all over the world. She continued her performances as a recitalist, chamber musician, composer, and as an orchestral soloist. She earned two Master of Music degrees at the University of New Orleans and then received her doctorate at Louisiana State University. Over her career, she has given over 60 solo concerts and has participated in over 200 concerts as an accompanist and chamber soloist.

Onalbayeva, an Artist-in-Residence at the University of Mobile, was named a Steinway Artist in April 2013. The first Steinway Artist selected from her home country of Kazakhstan, Onalbayeva joined a distinguished international roster of Steinway Artists including Billy Joel, Harry Connick, Jr. and past music greats such as Irving Berlin, Cole Porter, and Sergei Rachmaninoff.





She is President of the Gulf Coast Steinway Society and is co-director and pianist of the chamber ensemble, The Gulf Coast Virtuosi. In July 2011, she released a solo CD titled, Muzik...Menim Wuomerym... (Music...My Soul...) which consists of live performances in both Kazakhstan and the U.S.
